Youth Priorities

Issue of Concern	Supports needed/ Goals for issue
Busing	For many students, they need to take the bus to get to school and get back home. However, some students are not able to use the bus because they live too 'close' to the school. As a result, this may create a barrier for students to be able to attend their classes. Additionally, some buses are very late to pick up their students which may cause them to be late to either their classes, or late to getting to their homes.
Lack of educators of color	More emphasis must be placed on hiring and retaining teachers of color so that they feel valued and humanized. Although this issue may stem from BIPoC (Black Indigenous, People of Color) educators not applying, the district can be more transparent to at least acknowledge the contributions that these educators make for our students.
Mental Health Resources	Youth should be able to have easy access to their school's mental health resources. These resources should be readily available whenever and wherever a student may need help. Creating barriers or formality to it may cause students to shy away from such resources. Additionally, the more publicly such resources are advertised, students may feel comfortable with using their school's mental health resources.
Public Safety	The implementation of school resource officers has remained a salient point of contention among students with traumatic, first-hand experience with law enforcement. Students believe that school resource officers prevent educational environments from truly being conducive for learning and safety. We all hold a collective dedication to make schools safer, and the removal of school resource officers would not compromise school safety. Students implore school board members to consider other alternatives that do not require the use of law enforcement in school to ultimately allow students to feel safe—liberated from the domineering influence of school resource officers.
